THE MISSION of the

USS Houston CA-30 Survivors Association and Next Generations Scholarship Program

The USS Houston CA-30 was a gallant, heavy cruiser helping to defend the Allies in the South Pacific just after the Pearl Harbor attack of WW II. Overwhelming Japanese forces sank the USS Houston in the Sunda Strait, off Java, on March 1, 1942. A small percentage of the Houston's crew initially survived the ship's sinking that fateful night. These men went on to redefine the term "survivor" while attempting to live through three and one-half years as prisoners-of-war on the Burma-Thailand Railway and elsewhere. The notorious railway was made famous as depicted in the epic movie "Bridge on the River Kwai." One thousand sixty-eight men were aboard the Houston when she was sunk. Three hundred sixty-eight became POWs of the Japanese. Seventy-nine died from starvation, disease and brutality while in captivity. Approximately 275 men came home following the conclusion of WWII.

The original crew represented men from many different occupations, ethnic backgrounds and levels of education. The survivors went on to a variety of professional pursuits and successes. Many men of that generation did not have the opportunity to complete their high school education, as they were children of the Depression. Even fewer had the opportunity to obtain a college education. The survivors have decided to help further the education of the next generations of worthy young Americans through the USS *Houston* CA-30 Survivors Association and Next Generations Scholarship Program.

Let us always remember the USS *Houston* CA-30 and her valiant crew as other young people reach toward their educational goals assisted by this scholarship award based on the applicant's essay, grades and a review of extra-curricular activities.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICANT REQUIREMENTS

In order to apply for this scholarship, you must meet the following requirements:

- Be at least a high school senior planning to attend junior college, college, or college graduate
 about to enter graduate school- year one. Previous, unsuccessful applicants can reapply (with a
 new essay and updated application).
- Be related by blood or marriage to or associated with a crew member or descendant of the USS
 Houston CA-30, the Next Generation, the USS Houston CA-30 Association or simply be someone
 who has shown a keen interest in the history of the USS Houston CA-30 and the crew's legacy.
 This interest could come in the form of having participated in communications with any of the
 survivors and/or the Association while striving to learn more about the ship and its crew.
- Be able to document your current academic grades by submitting transcripts/grades which
 include your cumulative GPA. You must indicate whether your grades are based on a four or
 five-point rating system.
- Be able to document your community/civic/church/extra-curricular activities and/or work
 experience. Write an essay on one of the three topics listed in the Essay Topic Choices and
 observe all of the Essay Format Requirements. Include your Essay Topic Choice on the first page
 of your essay. Failure to follow these requirements will result in your essay being returned. If
 sufficient time allows for receipt by the deadline you may resubmit your revised essay for
 consideration. Candidates will be notified of item(s) needing correction. Please consider
 submitting your application well before the deadline date to avoid this problem.
- Complete each item as indicated on the Scholarship Application and provide all necessary supporting documents.
- The initial application and all succeeding correspondence must come from the applicant only.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS

You <u>must</u> provide the following documents:

- 1. Your completed application (see page 6).
- 2. Your original essay (see page 5 for specific instructions).
- 3. Your transcripts along with your cumulative GPA. You <u>must</u> indicate whether you are graded on a **four or five-point system**.
- 4. Your list of community/civic/church/extra-curricular activities and/or work experience (including hours per week) in which you are or have been active while attending school. (Use a separate piece of paper.) Include a contact person who can verify all information listed and his or her phone number.
- 5. Your description of your relationship **or** association with a crew member or descendant of the USS *Houston* CA-30, or your keen interest in the history and/or legacy of the crew. (Use a separate piece of paper.)

Note: All documents become the property of the USS *Houston* CA-30 Survivors Association and Next Generations Scholarship Committee.

Any incomplete applications or applications postmarked after the deadline date of' November 1st will not be considered. We would highly recommend that you conduct some research before you write your essay. A separate list of research items are listed on the last page of this packet.

ESSAY TOPIC CHOICES AND FORMAT REQUIREMENTS

Failure to follow these requirements will result in your essay being returned. If sufficient time allows for receipt by the deadline you may resubmit your revised essay for consideration. Candidates will be notified of item(s) needing correction. Please consider submitting your application well before the deadline date to avoid this problem.

- **Topic**: Write an <u>original</u> essay on any <u>one</u> of the following three topics:
 - 1. What does the memory of the crew of the USS Houston CA-30 mean to me?
 - 2. What is the significance of the USS *Houston* CA-30 as a part of the Asiatic Fleet in the Pacific Theater of' World War II?
 - 3. What have I learned about the character and the experiences of the USS *Houston* CA-30 crew while prisoners of the Japanese?
- **Title**: State your chosen topic as your title on page 1.
- **Format**: Use Times New Roman or Calibri font in either size 11 or 12; use 1-inch margins on all four sides; double-spaced.
- Length: Three to five pages double-spaced.
- Identification: Write the last four digits of your telephone number in the upper right hand corner of each page of your essay. This will identify your essay while ensuring confidentiality and objectivity. Do not make any reference to identify yourself or a crew member by name in your essay. Instead, you may use "my grandfather, uncle, brother, cousin," etc., if applicable. Failure to follow these requirements will result in your essay being returned. If sufficient time allows for receipt by the deadline you may resubmit your revised essay for consideration. Candidates will be notified of item(s) needing correction. Please consider submitting your application well before the deadline date to avoid this problem.

Your essay will be scored in the following areas and points may be deducted in each area:

Clarity and coherency

Ability to communicate an idea(s)

Effectiveness in writing

Credibility and sincerity

Grammar, Spelling and Punctuation

Content (including factual accuracy)

Originality (any non-original quote or paraphrase should be identified and attributed to its author.)

- 2. Review information available at the USS Houston CA-30 Survivors' Association & Next Generations www.usshouston.org.
- 3. Interview a family member of a USS Houston CA-30 survivor. In addition, many crew members have registered oral histories at institutions such as the University of North Texas, The National Museum of the Pacific, and the University of Southern Mississippi. These valuable oral histories are full of amazing accounts and allow our beloved men to still "talk to us."
- 4. Interview a knowledgeable Association member or an Association Board of Manager.
- 5. If able to visit the City of Houston, see the following:
 - -USS Houston CA-30 Memorial in Sam Houston Park 1100 Bagby Street in Houston, Texas.
 - -the permanent collection on display at the University of Houston Library
 - -the Legacy Room on the 1st floor of Houston's City Hall to see the McCandliss 6-foot replica model and video of Survivor, Howard Brooks.
